# Message from the Parish Council

As I pen this the weather continues to be exceptional for the time of year and I hope you are managing to enjoy the sunshine and longer days. Please be mindful however that the rates of Covid-19 are continuing to rise, so be sure to take the necessary steps to keep yourselves safe.

There has been much concern for those affected by the terrible events in the Ukraine, and a number of initiatives have been set up in and around Wantage to offer emergency support with supplies of clothing, blankets and medication being collected. For the latest on these and other nationwide initiatives please see the Wantage Facebook page or check the Vale of the White Horse Website. The requirements are changing regularly and this is the best way to ensure you can help contribute to the immediate needs. You can also donate money to the Disasters Emergency Committee at <a href="https://www.dec.org.uk">www.dec.org.uk</a>, or indeed there are many other Charities to support including the Red Cross, Save the Children, Salvation Army, among others. At its latest meeting the Parish Council agreed that the format for the next meeting, to be held on Monday 16 May, would be face to face in the village hall, but with the option of joining by Zoom. This meeting is our Annual Parish Meeting and we hope that you will be able to attend. The usual measures of face masks and distancing will continue to be applied. If you wish to attend it would be helpful if you could advise the Parish Clerk so that we can properly accommodate the numbers. As usual the meeting with start at 7.30pm and be followed by the Annual Parish Council Meeting.

In previous editions of the Register you will have seen the proposed event to mark the Platinum Jubilee, and I can now confirm that the celebrations will start on Thursday 2 June, 1.30-4.30pm with a Village Cream Tea, with music provided by the Hendred Ukulele Group. This event is hosted by the Parish Council and is free to the village but we would welcome any donations for Ukraine from those wishing to contribute. Many villagers have stepped forward with offers of help, but if you can bake a cake or help with the actual running of the event please contact the Parish Clerk, or telephone me on 772900. There are proposals for games to be arranged for the younger village residents and we hope that this will be confirmed by the next register. On the same evening there will be the ceremonial lighting of a Beacon on the Ridgeway at Segsbury Camp and we are grateful to the Good family for allowing this to take place. Please come and join with your village neighbours and friends on this special occasion. Further events over the remainder of the Platinum Weekend are also being planned and more detail will follow in the May Register. We hope to see you there.

Now that the majority of the work has been completed on the Parish Council Burial Ground improvements the Parish Council is keen to revisit the guidance which sets out the requirement for keeping the Burial Ground in good condition for all to enjoy. Sadly lately there has been an increase in the number of plastic flowers etc being cleared into the compost bin and this means that further sorting needs to take place before the green waste can be recycled. If you do remove any plastic flowers or memorials please do not place these with the green waste, please take them away with you. As a reminder the accepted number of memorials is one, so again please be mindful of this. Thank you.

You will have seen signs around the village advertising the Daffodil Day Tea on Saturday 2 Apriil, which will be held in the Church between 2 and 5pm. This is a new event so please come along and support it, and enjoy a delicious slice of cake and tea in the wonderful surroundings of our special Church. There will plants for sale, and of course wonderful walks around the village.

Finally the Parish Council would like to wish you all a Happy Easter, with, we hope, a continuation of the wonderful sunny weather. Please continue to stay safe.



# LETCOMBE REGIS RECREATION GROUND AND VILLAGE HALL '200 Club'

#### 24th Season - commences April 2022

The Letcombe Regis Recreation Ground and Village Hall Management Trust '200 Club' is about to enter its 24th year. The 200 Club is a key means by which the Trust raises funds for investment in and maintenance of the Recreation Ground and Village Hall. Some £95,000 has been raised over the past 23 years. About £45,000 of this has been won in prizes and £50,000 passed to the Recreation Ground and Village Hall Management Trust. Money raised in this way constitutes important 'locally raised' funds, evidence of which is essential for many competitive grant applications.

For those who haven't yet participated in the scheme, the Club sells numbers, each costing £24 per year. Approximately half the money received goes to supporting the Village Hall and Recreation Ground. The other half of the money is given out in prizes – typically five per month ranging from £5 to £50 with a top prize of £100 at Christmas. In addition there are two other monthly draws, details of which are given below. The amount of money available for prizes depends, of course, on how many numbers are sold. The Letcombe Register contains a list of the winners each month. During the 23rd Season, 240 numbers were sold raising £5,761 of which £2,735 was given out in prize money. Since 2017, the money received has been ring fenced for improvements to the Children's Play Area, and in 2022 £3,000 was added to this fund.

Note you can purchase as many numbers as you wish and you don't have to live in Letcombe Regis to become a member. Anyone joining part way through the season simply pays for the remaining months.

# **Topical Tips**

pring is definitely here! While I am writing this the daytime temperatures are wonderfully balmy and lulling us into rather a false sense of security as at night they are plummeting way down. Don't be tempted to clear your greenhouse of the tender plants just yet!

You can lift and divide any perennials that have grown too large or lost their shape. You will generate new plants in the process as well by doing this. It will also give you the opportunity to remove any perennial weeds like couch grass from amongst the clumps.

Finally you may want to put supports in place before perennials get too large. Criss-crossing string between posts works quite well for this.

You need to start getting on top of those weeds now before they take over. Have a general clean up of the borders as you may also have some plants that didn't survive the winter. Think of this as an opportunity to try something new!

You can continue to plant deciduous trees, shrubs and climbers and, towards the end of the month, evergreen shrubs.

You should give trees and shrubs a feed with a general purpose fertilizer and don't forget to feed your roses as they come into growth.

It's not too late to cut back your late summer and autumn flowering clematis if you have forgotten to do it.

You can also prune fig trees and also lavender. Make sure you make your cuts above fresh growth when pruning lavender. It won't re-generate from old wood.

If you have a pond then you can divide marginal and bog garden plants now. Make sure you contain vigorous plants in aquatic baskets.

If you suffer from algal bloom on your pond then you need to provide some shade. You can do this by growing a water lily in the pond.

Now over to fruit and veg. April is another bumper 'seed sowing' month. However proceed with caution here. We can still get some frosty nights. Remember. The veg patch will always catch up but you'll never regain the time you've lost or the expensive seed you've wasted!

Continue planting seed potatoes and finish planting out onion sets. You can sow beetroot, carrots, parsnips, lettuce, spinach, spring onions, kohl rabi, radish, turnips, early peas and Swiss chard in situ. You can also think about sowing your runner beans, sweetcorn, courgettes and squash under glass although you do still have plenty of time for this so don't get panicky if we reach the end of April and you still haven't done it.

As the days get longer and warmer I could think of lots more things to keep you out there but I think that's enough to be going on with so just get outside and enjoy!

# The Letcombes Conservation Group

Cowslips at Letcombe Castle

gring has arrived in splendour and many signs of its glory are all around the village. During the 'lockdowns' it was refreshing to concentrate on the natural beauty in our surroundings and the same is true during the current

global events. At Letcombe Castle the glorious display of cowslips, whose name may derive from cowpat as they were thought to grow in or near these, will be in flower this month, and in the churchyard many delights await such as the purple and pink chequered Snake's-head fritillaries and the Pasqueflower.





Whether or not Snake's-head fritillaries are a native species is debated but, whatever the origin, the nodding blooms have been adopted as the county flower of Oxfordshire. The <u>purple Pasqueflower</u> with a bright yellow centre is now rare on undisturbed, chalk grassland; in 2021 one came into bloom near the church gate on Easter morning living up to its name

which derives from 'paschal' meaning 'of Easter'.

Friday, 22<sup>nd</sup> April has been designated 'Earth Day' with the theme *Invest in our planet*. The day relates to everyone's involvement, 'Because a green future is a prosperous future. We need to act (boldly), innovate (broadly), and implement (equitably). It's going to take all of us... Businesses, governments, and citizens - everyone accounted for, and everyone accountable. A partnership for the planet.' See Earth Day 2022 | Invest in Our Planet™ for more details. The same call for all sections of society in the UK to move to greater action and investment in nature was endorsed by Nature Positive 2030, a joint report published in September 2021 by the UK's five statutory nature agencies (Natural England, Natural Resources Wales, NatureScot, Northern Ireland Environment Agency and the Joint Nature Conservation Committee). The report recommends embracing natural solutions to reverse biodiversity decline by 2030 and to ensure that nature's recovery plays a critical role in the path to Net Zero. The report sets out nine changes that can be delivered rapidly by national and local governments, landowners, businesses and others that will have particularly high impacts this decade. These range from ensuring wildlife thrives within protected areas on land and at sea and that wildlife habitats are better conserved outside protected areas, especially where integral to nature networks, to investing in habitat restoration and creation to strengthen nature networks that deliver for biodiversity and climate change. Outcomes for nature need to be integrated in development plans on land and at sea whilst tackling atmospheric and water pollution and developing the market for green finance. Developing the UK's evidence of nature-based solutions for climate change mitigation will support transformative changes underway and aid adoption of 'nature positive' targets.

Currently the UK is not on track to become 'nature positive' by 2030, however the aim is achievable. 

# Friends of the Letcombe Valley Community Nature Reserve

ometimes the familiar is overlooked in a search of something more unusual, but even wildlife that is widespread and resident all year round can be fascinating. On the Reserve lakes and the Letcombe Brook the moorhens have been busy pairing up to breed. The ritual begins with the male swimming towards the female with its bill dipped in the water, and eventually the two birds nibble at each other's feathers. Both birds build the nest out of dead

vegetation and twigs placed amongst floating plants, or on the ground adjacent to water, and will defend it ferociously, photo credit: Charles J. Sharp (CC BY-SA 3.0). Not all the eggs in the nest will be from the same female as moorhens have a strange habit of putting their eggs in the nest of others. This is actually a survival strategy used to increase egg viability. Unfortunately, it's not always possible to tell which egg is from an intruder, so rather than risk her own brood, the recipient female accepts the new egg. During the breeding season, quite a lot of pair-swapping goes on too. However, moorhens are a species, like Long-tailed tits, which breed co-operatively meaning that the older chicks help the adult birds to rear subsequent offspring bringing them food and protecting them against predators in a family-centric model.




Distinguishing a moorhen (*Gallinula chloropus*) from the slightly bigger wading bird, the coot (*Fulica atra*) is sometimes tricky, unless you remember the 'r' is for the moorhen's red bill with a yellow tip; there is no 'r' in coot.



Moorhens also have blackish-brown backs, separated by a white line from the blue-black body, photo credit: Alexis Lours (CC BY 4.0). The white patches under the tail are also distinctive, as are the yellow legs if they are visible. Moorhens appear to have a nervous twitch constantly flicking their white tail feathers which signals to any predator that the bird is awake, vigilant and ready to flee from attack. The more exposed a moorhen feels, the more rapidly it flicks. Even the orange-red bill with a bright yellow tip serves a purpose as health indicators. The red seems to be related to low levels of bacterial infection, and the yellow to blood parameters such as resistance to infection. The brighter the colours, the healthier the bird and hence more attractive as a mate. Coots are

almost entirely black in plumage, but they have a rather dirty-white bill and a neater white shield over the forehead, photo credit: Geni (CC BY-SA 4.0). Moorhens spend more time out of the water than coots and even climb trees. They are omnivores, eating everything from snails and insects to small fish and berries, whilst coots dive to eat waterweed and algae. When disturbed, moorhens usually take cover in nearby vegetation; flight is a short and laboured process. Classified in the UK as Amber under the Birds of Conservation Concern Red List (2021) their average lifespan is around three years. They are protected in the UK under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981.



Other wildlife to watch for in the Reserve this month include Large Red Damselflies (*Pyrrhosoma nymphula*) around



the pond. These are the earliest damselflies to emerge in the UK flying until late summer, and are one of our most common species, photo credit: Quartl (CC BY-SA 3). Signs of water vole activity may be more visible as they start to breed this month. Look out for burrow entrances in the bank, often with a nibbled 'lawn' of grass around the entrance, and piles of nibbled grass and stems showing a distinctive 45° angled-cut at the ends by the water's edge, or 'latrines' of rounded droppings. Sadly, since Kenneth Grahame wrote about Ratty and his friends in *The Wind in the Willows* in 1908, the UK has become one of the most nature-depleted countries in the world which is why the Reserve is so important for wildlife, as well as for the community.

The next work party at the Community Nature Reserve is on Saturday, 16th April from 13:30 to 16:30. Please meet near the lake notice board by 13:20 for the tasks and safety briefing. Tools will be provided, and refreshments mid-afternoon, but please take your own work gloves.
