Message from the Parish Council

Following the great success of the village Platinum Cream Tea in 2022, the PC are organising a CORONATION CREAM TEA to take place on Monday 8 May. There will be two sittings to accommodate the numbers and booking details will be circulated closer to the event. Once again HUG – Hendred Ukulele Group - will provide musical entertainment and for the children, (and adults!), a magician will also entertain.

The Platinum event saw a great number of villagers helping to make this day such a success and we would welcome any offers of help for this event. If you can bake a cake, scones or other teatime delicacies please let the Parish Clerk know on letregispc@gmail.com. If you can help on the day by putting up bunting, providing flowers, setting up the hall etc. please let us know. We are looking forward to another memorable event so please join us in the day.

At its recent meeting the PC reluctantly had to increase the precept to cover the rising costs we are experiencing. This is the first uplift in the precept for 6 years and amounts to around £5 per household.

In continuing to maximise our funds we are always seeking grant funding for village improvements and have recently had confirmed a grant of £1,000 approved by our County Councillor Yvonne Constance. This grant will support the reinstatement of an ECO pond on Warborough Road, which will be fed by water runoff, provide improved wildlife habitats and help address the issue of the water torrents that run down Warborough Road in times of wet weather. We are very grateful to Cllr Constance, and Cllr's Paul Barrow, Paul Batchelor, Mark Bradfield of the Letcombe Brook project and the landowner Tony Ruane at Warborough Farm for pulling the grant bid together at such short notice.

The PC is also conducting a survey into the use of the Council's website. Please do complete the survey details of which can be found in the Register (page # 11).

The recent PC meeting start time was brought forward from 8pm to 7pm and we have agreed that this revised start time will continue. Please make a note of this if you are intending to join us at our next meeting which is scheduled for Monday 20 March 7pm in the Village Hall.

Parish Council Elections




Parish Council elections are taking place on May 4th this year and several of the current councillors are standing down after an extremely busy four years in the post.

Another bumper audience for Januarys film when we had over 80 folk come out on a winters night to enjoy *Mrs Harris goes to Paris.* The film certainly lived up to its reputation as a life affirming feel-good story, just the ticket for a miserable January evening.

A change of scene for February when we are screening a biographical legal drama based on the memoir of defence attorney Bryan Stevenson. As a Harvard law graduate, Stevenson made the decision to represent poor people on death row and began his career in Alabama. His first case was that of Walter McMillan, a black man convicted of murdering a white woman. Following this case Stevenson went on to devote his career to fighting social injustice.

The film has a very strong cast with excellent performances by Jamie Foxx as Walter McMillan and Micheal B Jordan as Bryan Stevenson. Brie Larson and Rafe Spall are part of a strong supporting cast.

Just Mercy was released in 2019 and although very popular with both audiences and critics it has remained under the radar. We hope you enjoy it.

The Letcombes Conservation Group

s the North Wessex Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty came to the end of its 50th anniversary year on New Year's Day 2023, the Ridgeway began its 50th anniversary as a designated National Trail. The North Wessex Downs AONB still have 50 Things Not to Miss - North Wessex Downs AONB available on their website. The Ridgeway National Trail, stretching 140 kilometres from Avebury in Wiltshire to Ivinghoe Beacon in Buckinghamshire, was officially opened by Lord Nugent in 1973, though of course 'Britain's Oldest Road' has a long history of use by traders and invaders. Since its designation thousands of walkers, cyclists and horse riders have enjoyed scenic views, historic sites and wildlife from the National Trail. Summarising the aim of the 2023 Ridgeway

anniversary events, Simon Kearey, Chair of the Ridgeway Partnership, highlighted some of the past events along the route including 'King Alfred's battles with Viking armies in the 10th century and Churchill's famous radio speeches from Chequers during World War II... We want the anniversary year to be a time when people discover something amazing about The Ridgeway and share ideas on how we can keep The Ridgeway special for future generations.' The 'Ridgeway Top 50' is a year-long activity revealing the rich history, wildlife, art, farming, sport and landmarks of the Ridgeway. Each week information (factual or fictional) linked to experiences or places to visit on the Trail will be posted on social



media designed to offer ideas for days trips during 2023 and beyond. Check the posts at Ridgeway Top 50 - National Trails.

There are few patches of woodland along the Ridgeway large enough to support squirrel populations but in the villages this month grey squirrels will be active demonstrating their agility as they seek mates running along tree branches, as well as fences, power and telephone lines, and cracking open bird feeders to get at peanuts and seeds. The nuts of hazel, pine and walnut are favourite foods and are often cached in autumn, including in garden flowerbeds, lawns and pots. The females have two litters a year, each of three to four 'kits', the first in early spring before the leaves are on the trees and again in May. A rough nest or 'drey' about the size of a football is made of twigs in the autumn in the fork of a branch, at least six metres high up in a tree. It is lined with layers of soft moss, feathers, grass leaves or shredded bark. By widening the entrance, an existing hole in a tree trunk may be used and lined with similar materials. Autumn dreys are usually abandoned for flatter, more open summer versions. Grey squirrels are an invasive, non-native species first introduced from North America in 1876 by Victorian landowners alongside other exotics, such as peacocks and muntjac deer, in their parklands.

Though Beatrix Potter delighted readers with the character of Squirrel Nutkin in 1903, red squirrels were not



generally regarded highly. In the early 1800s 20,000 red squirrels were sold in London meat markets annually and in the early 1900s thousands were killed by foresters due to their bark-stripping damage in new conifer plantations. By the 1920s the grey population was increasing at the expense of the native red squirrel, a smaller animal with a reddish-brown coat and pale underside, a bushy tail and large ear tuffs, photo credit: Peter Trimmings (CC BY 2.0). By 1932 it was illegal to release a grey squirrel in Britain, but the damage had been done. Red squirrels are now a priority species protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act, 1981 and found only in isolated pockets in Scotland, Cumbria and Northumberland plus remnant populations in Formby, Anglesey, Brownsea Island and the Isle of Wight. Blood-testing surveys in the 1990s

revealed that 60-70% of grey squirrels carry squirrel-pox, a virus to which they appear immune though it causes lesions in red squirrels that prevent feeding and results in death within a week. Sadly this is a pattern often seen when non-native animals introduce new diseases that decimate native species.



Friends of the Letcombe Valley Community Nature Reserve

ork parties continue in the Community Nature Reserve on Saturday, 18 February from 13:30 to 16:30. Please meet near the lake notice board by 13:20 for the tasks and safety briefing. At this time of year the main tasks are likely to be scrub clearance, fence repairs, minor tree pruning over paths and general maintenance. Wellingtons will be required to work on the new pond. Tools will be provided, and refreshments too mid-afternoon, but please take your own work gloves.

The vegetation in the brook and lake in the Reserve was hit back by the cold snap in January whilst the water level rose from runoff during high rainfall on to frozen ground; perfect conditions for the lone Little Egret to feed in the

brook alongside groups of Mallard ducks. The Little Egret's distinguishing yellow feet are visible in flight, photo credit: John Culley. Possibly the Little Egret will be joined by others later this spring. Hazel catkins are just appearing and catch the sunshine with their bright yellow pollen. A Red Poll, a small finch and winter visitor, has been sighted in the Reserve meadow area. The diagnostic features of these birds are a red patch on the head of both sexes, a small black bib under the beak, a pale grey-brown body (lighter underside) with pinkish hues in the male and wings with darker brown streaks between white bars, photo credit Bengt Nyman (CC BY2.0).



Red Polls are a more common sight in the east of the country migrating from their breeding sites around the Arctic



Ocean; a rare sight for Letcombe but worldwide their population numbers are estimated in the tens of millions. These birds have throat pouches used for temporarily storing seeds to swallow later in a protected, warm spot. They can also store up to two grams of seeds, around a quarter of their daily energy requirement, in a stretchy part of their oesophagus. Studies have shown that these busy birds eat up to 42% of their body mass each day. Maybe the Red Poll seen in the Reserve was feeding on the catkins, a source of nutrients for them in spring as well their diet of seeds and buds from willows, alders, birches and small conifers. Also locally, a barn owl has been seen hunting

during the day, not unusual behaviour in winter when food sources are less plentiful, and an otter has been recorded.

Keeping a record of observations in the Reserve and along the brook provides information on the local wildlife populations and is useful to track any variation related to climate change that then can be considered in BBOWT's management plans. BBOWT staff and volunteers carried out 250 ecological surveys in their nature reserves in 2022 ranging from butterfly, bird and dragonfly transects to habitat condition assessments, monitoring badger, bat, newt and reptile activity and checking dormice nest boxes. Mark Bradfield, Letcombe Brook Project Officer, is encouraging recording by local residents of observations whilst walking in the Reserve and along the Letcombe Brook using the iRecord App, free to download from https://irecord.org.uk/app on a smartphone. Alternatively observations may be recorded on the Thames Valley Environmental Record Centre, see Share your records Inthe locality easily. As Mark points out, such records provide 'an opportunity to demonstrate how important the Letcombe Brook and its green corridor is for wildlife' which is vital to being included in the establishment of recognised Nature Recovery Networks in Oxfordshire in 2023.



Letcombe Football Club

We start February with the good results from the St Andrew's Gift Day at the end of November. This event was well attended and happily just over £3000 was raised. David Allchin, our Treasurer, has sent a detailed letter explaining the church's finances to all those who support St Andrew's.

The New Year began with a service of Holy Communion on Sunday 1st January. The Revd Mary Harwood showed her multi-tasking abilities by presiding at the service and also playing the organ which she carried out with aplomb. Having a service on New Year's Day was special for everyone enabling us to exchange New Year wishes with other members of the congregation. Mary was able to tell us the happy news that our church warden, Debbie, is recovering well from her operation and Ruth Manning brought us all greetings from Debbie herself.

On the following Sunday there was the usual second Sunday in the month service with Revd Mary Harwood presiding again. Topical Tips

After rather a soggy January I hope you all have your water butts fully topped up ready for the season to come!

Your garden should be showing more signs of life with snowdrops doing their thing. You can divide them now to increase your displays.

If you stored dahlia tubers over the winter then you can get ahead of the game this month by starting them into growth before potting up. Place the tubers in a warm, dry place and remember to mist them regularly to stop them from drying out.

You can also get fuchsia plants back into growth by cutting them back then placing them in a warm place.

I say this every year. Cut off the old hellebore leaves. You will then be able to see the flowers better and the leaves can harbour disease.

You can cut back ornamental grasses now if you left the seed heads on for winter interest.

Sweet peas can be sown this month. If you already have sweet pea plants that you started in the autumn then do watch out for aphids and get rid of them quickly. They can spread sweet pea viruses.

A bit of pruning always keeps one warm on cold winter days. Some of the winter flowering shrubs should have finished flowering now so you can get on with pruning them if necessary.

This month is also the time to have a good go at your clematis. We're talking about 'Group 3' types here, that is, viticellas and late flowering clematis like tanguticas.

Yes, we all know that I'm not a big 'lawn person' but I suddenly feel the need to insert something as lawns do provide a wonderful backdrop to the borders!

Don't be tempted to 'scalp' your lawn too soon. It won't thank you for it. Also try not to walk on it if it's frosty.

Did you know that worm casts are the sign of a healthy lawn? You can brush them off if you want a bowling green' though!

Another interesting snippet of information I have found is that mole activity tends to increase in January and February due to mating and nest building (or the description I liked, fortress building). It suggests you try and live with them; again this is tricky if your lawn is your pride and joy.

Still not much to be said for fruit and veg but there are signs that the season is starting. Winter veg should be producing a bit of new growth.

You can sow early peas and broad beans. Don't try sowing broad bean aquadulce now though as it's only really suitable for autumn sowing.

If you do decide to sow your parsnips this month then make sure you choose a canker resistant variety.

On the fruit front you can top dress all your fruit trees and soft fruit bushes with fertilizer and finish off any winter pruning.

Remember that if you have any produce that you have stored over the winter then it will be starting to regrow now so check it. The classic is a sack full of potatoes that have completely grown together into a solid lump!!

Well I think that's all for now. Here's to a great new gardening season just on the horizon. Enjoy!
