Water water everywhere and usually in the wrong place!

Following the significant recent rainfall the village has again seen a large flood outside Bablakes. Despite the best efforts of the Parish Council at the time, there was little response from the authorities and a number of vehicles were damaged. Please be very cautious when This is a highly complex issue and difficult to summarise in approaching water as there is no telling what lays beneath. I am pleased to confirm that there has now been a meeting on site between the Parish Councillors and the Authority and there are plans in place to install a further culvert to help move the surface water off of the road into the Letcombe Brook. This work is likely to commence in April/ May so please take care when driving in the area. As ever if you spot a road problem please report it on Fixmystreet (https://fixmystreet.oxfordshire.gov.uk) and let the Parish Clerk know. One advantage of the recent rains is the full flowing Letcombe Brook and its tributaries.

Now a regular reminder, having recently approved its Budget for 2020/2021, the PC has once again set aside a fund for Community Projects. If you have any ideas and need support please contact the Parish Clerk who will be happy to provide more details.

Developments with the review of the Local and Regional Health provision, including the potential future of Wantage Hospital can be found alongside. Work to refresh the village website is continuing and we hope will be completed over the next two months. If you have any suggestions please contact the Parish Clerk.

Thank you to all those organisers and brave villagers, and others, who battled through Storm Dennis to support the Snowdrop Event held by the Church and the WI recently. Funds raised were split equally between the two organising groups.

We regularly receive concerns relating to speeding vehicles in and around the village and we are planning to improve both roadside signage and road markings. The final proposals will be discussed at our next meeting on 16th March, 8pm in the Warborough Room. We anticipate the work should take place over the next few months, so advance apologies for any inconvenience caused. If you are concerned by particular bad driving or speeding please note the vehicle number, date and time and report to the Police on 101. Please also inform the Parish Clerk so the PC can keep a log.

The proposals for the improvements to the Burial Ground have received approval from the Planning Authority, and the PC is now seeking quotes for the work. If you are interested or know of any reliable contractors please let the Parish Clerk know. We anticipate work will commence towards the start of Summer.

Please note that the Village Litter Pick will take place 20th March, kindly coordinated by Alison Phillips. Please let her know if you can help. Details on page 3.

Finally it was pleasing to welcome so many of you to our recent meeting. If there are any issues you would like to raise, or anything you feel should be discussed we are always happy to receive them. Please contact any Councillor or the Parish Clerk.

Health provision review for OX12 and Wantage Hospital

I thought it might be helpful to summarise where we are with the review of health provision in OX12 and Wantage Hospital.

a few short paragraphs. This is the compact version and if anyone wants a more detailed review please mail me at paul.barrow@whitehorsedc.gov.uk.

- The Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group (OCCG) has been carrying out a review of health service provision for the OX12 post-code.
- As a VWHDC councillor, I am a member of a scrutiny sub-committee overseeing this.
- OCCG has been very opaque in all their activities and are not used to democratic scrutiny.
- OCCG has carried out surveys and a public consultation.
- One of the main issues for the OX12 public has been the closure of Wantage Hospital and in-patient beds.
- The review carried out by OCCG has not been at all transparent and has not, for example:
 - Used the most up-to-date analytical methods.
- Reviewed Wantage Hospital in association with the other local community hospitals (Abingdon, Didcot, Wallingford).
- Taken into account changes taking place nationally in the NHS.
- (iv) Has not been open in their review of the GP practices (shortage of GPs, additional medical staff, how they will carry out home care etc.).
- Reviewed the effect of a 35% increase in population in OX12.
- Reviewed dove-tailing health and social care as suggested.
- (vii) Been open about funding limitations.
- A report of their review (which is far from complete) has initiated a consultation on the future of Wantage Hospital to be completed by this coming September. The chairman of the Health Overview Scrutiny Committee (HOSC) expects that if this consultation is not complete by September then the Wantage beds will be re-opened.
- Wantage Town and Grove Parish Councils and pressure groups wanted the OCCG report to be rejected. HOSC did not do this because (i) the review covers the whole of OX12 health services and not just Wantage Hospital and (ii) complete rejection would result in further delays.
- Instead, HOSC has asked our OX12 scrutiny sub-committee to continue and "keep OCCG's feet to the fire" to ensure that bullet points (i) to (vii) are done properly! We intend to do this.

The real attraction of that soggy afternoon was the excellent tea and cakes provided by members of the village WI, for which we were all truly grateful

By the time this Register reaches you Lent, that long period of Christian preparation leading up to Easter, will have started with the services on Ash Wednesday, 26th February. We often talk about 'giving something up for Lent' - some pleasure or treat, like chocolate or beer – that is our rather pale imitation of fasting through Lent practised by Christians over many centuries. Perhaps when stored food from the previous year's harvest was getting low towards the end of winter, as was often the case till relatively recent times, fasting and conserving food till Spring would not have seemed so odd as it does to us

Maybe 'taking up something for Lent' is more suited to our times and lives. It has been the custom amongst the Ridgeway parishes to hold weekly sessions to reflect on a book provoking thoughts on the Christian life during the reflective time of Lent. This year the book is The Art of Lent - A painting a day from Ash Wednesday to Easter by Sister Wendy Beckett. Those of us who can remember back to television in the 1990s may remember Sister Wendy's art programmes, delivered with great enthusiasm and erudition on many paintings. And part of the fascination was to see this nun, from a fairly austere order of nuns, in complete nun's attire - wimple and all holding forth in front of a renaissance painting full of largely unclothed bodies. But as she said herself: "God did not make a mistake when He created the human body, so I am not making a mistake by describing it."

Join Sister Wendy on a journey through Lent, and discover the timeless wisdom to be found in some of the world's greatest paintings. Her book and reflections on it will certainly be thought-provoking. It was good to hear our Oxfordshire County councillor and Vale of the White Horse District councillor, Yvonne Constance, speak so positively about the protection against development afforded to AONBs at the January Parish Council Meeting in Letcombe Regis. government has yet to respond to the 27 recommendations out. Please text Geoff on 07772518938 to join the of the Glover Landscapes Review Report which included connecting future generations to nature in childhood and

throughout their lives, as well as expanding the open access rights in 'national landscapes' i.e. national parks and AONBs. Funding will continue to be an issue and, whilst the promised re-surfacing of some Green lanes in Regis Parish is much welcomed, County Councils have no ring-fenced funding for rights of way. The Glover Report concludes that alongside our network of paths, sustainable public transport is critical if 'national landscapes' are going to be truly accessible to all; people should be able to walk from their doorstep or, at the very least, from a train station or well-served bus stop to explore them. As of 13th February 2020 a new Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, George Eustice, was appointed to take over from Theresa Villiers who had been in post only since 24 July 2019 replacing Michael Gove. These are unusual political times so to make sure that the important Glover Report does not sit on the shelf, pressure may need to be put on our government for a timely response.

Topical Tips

Spring is here! Let's hope that it brings fewer torrential downpours so we can all get outside more and enjoy it. Work in the garden really ramps up this month so let me see if I can suggest a few things to get you back into the swing of things.

Let's start with a bit of chopping. If you have any cornus or salix that have been providing wonderful stem colour through the winter then now is the time to cut them back. You can also prune bush and climbing roses now and tidy up your honeysuckle.

Why not be adventurous and try a bit of layering? This will work well with climbers like honeysuckle and lax stemmed shrubs like philadelphus. Just lay some stems on the ground and bury and they should root by next spring.

Moving swiftly on to perennials, you can lift and divide them in March. This will enable you to produce lots of new plants as well. Now is also a good time to plant new perennials. I don't want to cast gloom here but the slugs will really appreciate the new shoots of your perennials so you'll need to keep a watch out for them!

If you have space in the greenhouse (vain hope) then pot on cuttings of tender perennials that you took last season. You can propagate new dahlias by planting the tubers in compost then taking cuttings using the new shoots.

You do need to keep an eye open for pests in the greenhouse from now. Vine weevil larvae, the bane of potted plants, become active this month. You can control them biologically of chemically or just check the root ball, remove any larvae and re-pot.

March is a very busy month for fruit and veg growers as you need to start sowing your seed. You can also plant onion and shallot sets and early potatoes.

If you haven't started a strawberry bed yet then you can do so this month.

Well I think that is probably enough to be going on with. I'll leave you to potter around and 'discover' anything else that James Corden. needs doing. Enjoy!

LETCOMBE REGIS RECREATION GROUND AND VILLAGE HALL '200 Club'

22nd Season – commences April 2020

The Letcombe Regis Recreation Ground and Village Hall Management Committee '200 Club' is about to enter its 22nd year. The Club is a key means by which the Committee raises funds for investment in and maintenance of the Recreation Ground and Village Hall. Some £87,000 has been raised over the past 21 years. About £39,000 of this has been won in prizes and £47,000 passed to the Recreation Ground and Village Hall Management Committee. Money raised in this way constitutes important 'locally raised' funds, evidence of which is essential for many competitive grant applications.

For those who haven't yet participated in the scheme, the Club sells numbers, each costing £24 per year. Approximately half the money received goes to supporting the Village Hall and Recreation Ground. The other half of the money is given out in prizes – typically five per month ranging from £5 to £50 with a top prize of £100 at Christmas. In addition there are two other monthly draws, details of which are given below. The amount of money available for prizes depends, of course, on how many numbers are sold. The result of each draw is posted on the Village Notice Board near The Greyhound. The Letcombe Register also contains a list of the winners each month. During the 21st Season, 235 numbers were sold raising £5,600 of which £2,635 was given out in prize money.

Note you can purchase as many numbers as you wish and you don't have to live in Letcombe Regis to become a member. Anyone joining part way through the season simply pays for the remaining months.
