Message from the Parish Council

There is much to look forward to with the lifting on the tight lockdown restrictions and the opening up of services and facilities. Social contact is beginning to return and with the onset of sunny days we can all see a brighter future. Please do remain vigilant though as we cautiously return to a semblance of normality. Free Covid19 Testing Kits are available, either by ordering on line or from local collection points. Our closest is the Beacon in Wantage. These can help keep you and others safe and are simple to use.

There are some key dates this May, with Local Elections taking place on 6 May, with our local voting station being the Village Hall. The Annual Parish Meeting will also take place, via Zoom, on Monday 17 May, from 7.30pm. Please contact the Clerk requesting the link if you wish to join us. All are welcome. The Agenda appears elsewhere in this Register. This is followed immediately by the Annual Parish Council Meeting for those wishing to remain.

The improved Pavilion reopened its doors recently, and this now provides a super 'watering hole' especially during the summer months. All those living in the Parish are entitled to become social members for just £12 per year. Please contact <u>letcombesportsclub@gmail.com</u> for details.

It is expected that the improvement works to the Burial Ground will commence later in the summer and our sincere thanks go to Phil Hodgson for his vital assistance in getting this project underway.

There have been improvements works to the road drainage in the Bablakes area and we anticipate that there will be no more significant flooding along this stretch of road. A number of pot holes are continuing to appear however so please, please, help the Parish Council by reporting them on <u>Fix My Street</u>. Your additional reporting brings the issue higher in the priority listing.

There has been some work undertaken to clear out the grips and the drainage throughout the village, and there is further finishing work to be done. We hope that this may go some way to help prevent the water laying on the roads during wet weather and thereby reduce the number of potholes.

You will have been advised by separate email that the 'boardwalk section' of the footpath on the boundary of Richmond Village has had to be closed temporarily for repairs. We will notify as soon as we hear the work has been completed. We are also engaging with Oxfordshire County Council to sort out repairs to the bridge over the Letcombe Brook to the back of the Millennium Green. Two boards are rotten and will need to be replaced.

Over the next couple of months we will be placing a bench to the side of the footpath between Letcombe and Wantage to enable those walking the path to take a break, and enjoy the wonderful views. The Parish Council is extremely grateful to the local landowner who has agreed that the bench can be placed on his land.

We continue to seek improvements to the Broadband in the Parish as we appreciate the flaky nature of the current arrangements. This is not an easy task, but please be assured we will be doing everything we can to take up any opportunities. Any developments will be communicated through the Register and the Village Email.

On a more sombre note, the Parish Council was saddened to hear of the death of HRH Prince Philip, and are grateful to all those who contributed to, and attended, the jointly planned Civic Service to mark his passing.

I was the 135th speaker for the House of Commons motion to pay tribute to Prince Philip, but they only got to the 131st MP. Had I been able to speak I would have recounted an anecdote in James Callaghan's book in which he found himself squeezed into a small car with Prince Philip and Margaret Thatcher. Despite the fact he had been PM, he wrote "I recognised at once the force of their characters and decided that my best contribution to the general



happiness would be to remain quite quiet." Sensible man. Few people will serve their country as long and as steadfastly as Prince Philip did ours.

So far, so good, on reopening post lockdown. I spent most of the first full Friday I could visiting shops and pubs who were, as you can imagine, pleased to have reopened – despite that snow on day 1! Just before the retail visits, I'd been at the Sylva Foundation and the Earth Trust in Little Wittenham and been inspired by what both are doing. Make sure you check out the brand-new Earth Lab the latter has been building, which will open in the near future, not least to admire its construction. It is built with glulam beams and has a rammed earth wall, straw insulation and a wildflower roof – I got a sneak peek and was very impressed.

I am among the MPs who has returned to parliament Monday-Thursday each week (parliament only sits on occasional Fridays). It's not exactly lively yet – many MPs are continuing to participate virtually and there are so many restrictions in every part of the building, including the continuation of the 50 person limit in the House of Commons, that you don't see many people in the way you used to. But important business continues to proceed, including the Domestic Abuse and Finance Bills.

Much continues to be by Zoom however. It has been a pleasure to continue to attend meetings of parish councils, most recently that of Aston Tirrold and Aston Upthorpe. I am always impressed with the dedication of people who sit on parish councils as there is not a lot of glory to the posts, but they're vital to ensuring that very local issues get the consideration they should. And, of course, parish councils played a key role in the community's response to Covid. I also continue to take searching questions from school children via Zoom – as I did just before Easter with Sutton Courtenay primary school. Some of the questions children ask you are tougher than the ones adults do.

The constituency and Oxfordshire have done very well from the Government's Culture Recovery Fund, with Didcot Railway Centre, Oxford Philharmonic Orchestra and Origin Technical Productions receiving a combined £400,000 in the latest round and 31 organisations receiving over £5 million overall – I hope we see them all flourish when they can get back to normal.

Letcombes Gardening Club

Topical Tips

s we enter May we are moving into late spring and lets hope this brings slightly warmer nights so our poor plants don't keep getting a cold shock!

May is the month when we should be able to start freeing up our greenhouses of all those tender specimens but don't do this at the beginning of the month as there is still a danger of a short cold snap or two.

It is still not too late to divide perennials so any of you who are thinking of participating in the Gardening Club online Plant Market take note; there is still time to generate some plants! Spring flowering perennials, like pulmonaria, will have 'done their stuff' now so clip them back and you'll get nice fresh leaves which are almost as attractive as the flowers.

You can have a go at some cuttings of pelargoniums and fuchsias now and this will provide you with lots of fresh new plants for later in the summer.

If you're in a tidying up mood then here's a little word of warning. Let the foliage of spring bulbs die down naturally as this gives the bulbs a chance to regenerate and thus you'll have more chance of flowers next spring. I know they look untidy but if you plant perennials around them then they will be hidden. Do lift spent forget-me-nots though if you don't want a forget-me-not monoculture next year!

Put plant supports in place now before perennials start to flop.

Any plants that you have raised from seed and cuttings and that are destined for outside can be hardened off this month. Do this over a period of about 10-14days by just leaving them outside during the day to get them accustomed to the lower temperatures.

Another little tip before we leave the subject of flowers. If you want nice bushy chrysanthemums then pinch out the tops. If you leave them then you'll get tall thin sprays. Removing a few flower buds will give you larger blooms.

You can prune back more tender shrubs this month and clip evergreen hedges but do watch out for nesting birds.

If you have a clematis montana you will be aware that these can become huge. Now is the time to give it a trim if necessary. Don't be afraid of this. They take even hard cutting back very well.

Now I mustn't leave out the veg growers amongst you! You can sow climbing and french beans, sweetcorn, courgettes and squash under glass this month ready for planting out next month. This is a particularly good idea with beans as slugs and snails really relish the new shoots and sometimes eat them away completely if they are sown direct.

You can do successional sowings of salad leaves and radish and many sorts of brassica can be direct sown this month if you prefer.

Your rhubarb should be ready to harvest now and remember to keep cutting asparagus. What a treat!

Well, I think that's all from me for now so enjoy your garden!

t. Andrew's churchyard has been a wonderful sight this Spring, full of wildflowers due to the dedication of Anne Williams. The delicate, purple and white Snake's Head Fritillaries,



Fritillaria meleagris, have spread gradually over a wider area dotted amongst the primroses. In past centuries these once common flowers were sold at Covent Garden and London children sold posies picked from the meadows along the River Thames for a penny or two, but now the plant is on the UK Red Data list and classed as vulnerable. On cue, the deep purple petals of a Pasqueflower, *Pulsatilla vulgaris*, opened on Easter Day to reveal its bright yellow, stamen-filled centre surrounded by feathery, grey-green leaves. Several more of these very rare flowers, also known as the 'anemone of Passiontide', opened

subsequently; their common name derived from the word 'paschal' meaning 'of Easter'. This is another flower classed as vulnerable on the UK Red Data List and restricted to a few nature reserves with undisturbed chalk and limestone grasslands, while internationally the Pasqueflower is classified as a threatened species.

Pale yellow oxlips, Primula elatior, stood taller than the



rimula elatior, stood taller than the primroses and now the brighter yellow, bell-shaped cowslips, *Primula veris*, are in full display. Traditionally cowslip

flowers adorned May Day garlands and were strewn on church paths for weddings. Watch out for other delights appearing in May including the Star of Bethlehem, *Ornithogalum umbellatum*, with white star-shaped, nectar and pollen rich flowers that attract bees and other pollinators.

The eastern grassy mound is buzzing with one of the UK's most distinctive solitary bees, Ashy mining bees, *Andrena cineraria, which* feed on the wide variety of spring flowers and shrubs. The female bee has two ash-coloured bands across the thorax and white hair on the head. The glossy black abdomen can look bluish in bright light, perhaps

explaining why some people mistakenly thought the churchyard had a plague of flies. The males have similar markings but are smaller. Each female creates their own nest burrow by excavating small tunnels in the soil, the entrance looking like a mini-volcano. Ashy mining bees often close this entrance over after foraging for the day and when it rains, or if they are disturbed. Females will lay eggs for a couple of months after they first emerge, then end their lifespan. They line and waterproof individual cells within the nest with a waxy substance, each cell holding an egg provided with pollen and nectar supplies for the larva to over-winter. A large nesting aggregation has been built up this Spring and the cycle will continue next year.



The Letcombes Conservation Group will participate in the *Churches Count on Nature* week, a conservation initiative promoted by *Caring for God's acre*, the Church of England and the Church in Wales. Recording sessions will be run in St. Andrew's churchyard during the week of 5-13 June to contribute to a nationwide database of wildlife in the UK. Do note the week in your diary and check the June edition of the Letcombe Register for details on how to join in.

Friends of the Letcombe Valley **Community Nature Reserve**

Yummer visitors are here, and not just the two or four-legged variety that arrive to walk in the Reserve on fine days. 'Summer visitors' is a slightly misleading term for birds that fly to the UK in the spring to breed. During their stay, they will feed on plentiful insects and leave again in the autumn. Listening for the first cuckoo's arrival from sub-Saharan Africa is a tradition but sadly numbers in the UK have dropped by 65% since the 1980s. Researchers suggest the cause may be related primarily to a climate-induced time shift in nesting by host birds such as the Dunnock, Pied Wagtail and Reed Warbler and, to a lesser degree, to a decline in host species such as the Meadow Pipit due to lack of food and agricultural intensification. Other factors include a decline in caterpillar numbers here during the breeding season, and deterioration of conditions along the migration route and in the over-wintering grounds.

The list of summer visitors also includes Swallows, Swifts, and House Martins. These birds are insectivorous and

catch insects in mid-air in wide-gaped bills. They drink also on the wing, scooping their bills across the surface of the brook and lake waters in the Reserve as they fly. Swallows, both male and female, have glossy, green or bluish feathers on their backs and red throats, but they are seen most often in silhouette and distinguished by their long, forked tails. The shape of the long tails indicates status - the females are apparently attracted by males with more symmetrical tails. Studies have discovered that 44% of swallow pairs reoccupy the same nests on return from Africa, a phenomenon called philopatry or 'nest-faithfulness'. This

seems practical considering the number of flights and the time taken to build a nest from mud, and requires only a re -line by the female each year. An estimated one million swallows visit the UK each summer, 11th in world swallow populations.

Smaller than swallows at around 12 cm long with a wingspan of 26 to 29 cm, House Martins have a short forked tail,



glossy blue\ black feathers on the back with short, thin, black beaks. They can be distinguished from swallows by the white feathers on the underparts, rear and legs. The birds pair to breed but only stay together for one breeding season and do not pair up again the following year. Their closed nests, except for the entrance hole at the top, take around ten days to make from over 1000 beak-sized mud pellets and are often found in colonies. The two-year lifespan of a House Martin is

short in which typically they raise only two or three broods, the first at the age of one. Unusually for birds, the young from the first brood will help to feed the second.

Swifts are the medium sized birds in this African group of superb fliers with long, curved, narrow wings and a short forked tail. They are dark brown apart from a pale throat but look black in silhouette as they swoop fast and low into crevices in buildings where they nest. Swift legs and feet are so small that they do not perch on telegraph wires or fences and even sleep in flight. Their call is a piercing scream but is only heard in flight, not on the nest.



The number of birds observed in the past month in the Community Nature Reserve is phenomenal: Blackbird, Blackcap, Buzzard, Chaffinch, Chiffchaff, Corn Bunting, Carrion Crow, Collared Dove, Stock Dove, Little Egret, Gadwall, Goldfinch, Little Grebe, Red Kite, Magpie, Mallard, Moorhen, Nuthatch, Pheasant, Robin, Rook, Hedge Sparrow, House Sparrow, Swallow, Mistle Thrush, Song Thrush, Blue Tit, Great Tit, Tree creeper, Grey Wagtail, Water rail, Whitethroat, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Woodpigeon and Wren plus two other summer visitors, Pied Flycatcher and Yellow Wagtail. 'Take nothing but pictures, leave nothing but footprints, kill nothing but time', sit or step quietly and you too will see the wildlife that thrives in this special place.
