



Letcombes Gardening Club

Topical Tips

W e've been having some lovely weather recently, with a bit of rain in the mix to help the plants grow. The roses have really gone mad this year. I hope all your gardens are looking beautiful.

July can be one of the hottest months in the year so it's a good time to take advantage of the weather and sit outside in the shade and admire your garden. Deadheading is a nice gentle task so keep on top of this so the plants remain looking at their best.

Cut back delphiniums and geraniums after they have flowered as they may then reward you with a second flush.

If you grow bearded iris and they have become congested, then now is the time to lift and replant them. Remove any old rhizome and plant the newer sections so that the top of the rhizome is above soil level.

Keep an eye on your borders and if you have any tall perennials that are starting to flop then stake them quickly before they lose their shape.

You can prune June flowering shrubs like philadelphus and weigela this month.

You may find that your pond, if you have one, gets rather low at this time of year. When you refill it use a spray attachment, as this will aerate it. The pond life will thank you for this!

Talking of pond life, why not put a few upright marginals, like iris, in your pond? Fully developed damselflies and dragonflies emerge from the water by climbing up tall stems.

Lets talk briefly about houseplants. Many of these can benefit from being moved outside in the summer. This also lessens the risk of pests such as red spider mite.

It's a good idea to damp down the floor of your greenhouse on hot days. Make sure you keep plant debris to a minimum, as this will reduce the risk of greenhouse pests.

Now on to fruit and veg. I know people on the allotments are going to groan at this, but I'm afraid watering is an essential task at this time of year. All those of us at the allotments found out just how true this is last year when we all ran out of collected water and many of our crops failed because of the extremely dry weather. Lets hope we get a little more rain this year!

You can still pick rhubarb up until the end of this month but then give it a chance to revive by leaving it be.

You should be able to harvest your early potatoes now and also your onions and shallots if the foliage has dried up.

You can still sow seeds this month. We're talking more about over-wintering veg though like radicchio, chicory and spring cabbage. You can also sow pak choi.

Well I think that's enough for now so make the most of any good weather, get out there and enjoy!

Let's hope this warm weather continues! Don't forget that the meeting starts at an earlier time, 7.00.



Butterfly Conservation

Friends of the Letcombe Valley Nature Reserve

Work parties continue in the Community Nature Reserve on Saturday, 15 July from 13:30 to 16:30. Please meet near the lake notice board by 13:20 for the tasks and safety briefing. The main tasks are likely to be scrub clearance, fence repairs, minor tree pruning over paths and general maintenance. Wellingtons will be required to work on the new pond. Tools will be provided, and refreshments mid-afternoon, but please take your own work gloves.

The Community Nature Reserve is a wonderful location to spot butterflies. Why not record your observations for The Big Butterfly Count which this year begins on Friday, 14 July 2023 and runs until Sunday, 6 August. This UK-wide survey is the world's largest butterfly survey. The data collected over 15 minute intervals in the two week period helps to assess the health of ecosystems with information on the population and habits of various butterflies and some day-flying moths. All the information to prepare for a count, including an identification chart, and how to submit observations is available at <u>Big Butterfly Count (butterfly-conservation.org)</u>.

In 2022 the Gatekeeper was the most recorded species during the Big Count. This species is seen along the hedgerows and woodland edges in the Community Reserve quite regularly but 2021 saw a national decline so it is

good news that the species made a recovery, photo right credit: Sannse (CC BY-SA 3.0). Both the Common Blue and Holly Blue species also recovered from their worst results in 2021 and the Comma continued a slow recovery from its low point in the early 20th century. Some species increased their range northwards; the Holly Blue butterfly, for example, was rare in Scotland prior to 2000 but, with climate change, in the first decade since became established in Edinburgh and in Ayr and now has spread across Scotland. The sad news is that overall numbers of many common species, such as Red Admiral, Small White and Meadow Brown, remain in decline and the average seen per count in 2022 (just under 9 butterflies) was an all-time low



since the citizen science project began in 2010 despite the good weather in many parts of the UK. Head of Science for Butterfly Conservation, Dr Richard Fox, commented: "The fact that more butterflies weren't seen is concerning and it's clear that much more needs to be done to protect and restore habitats to aid nature recovery. The sun could shine for days on end, but we still won't see more butterflies unless there is habitat for them to thrive in." A list of butterfly winners and losers in 2022 is available at <u>Results of this year's Big Butterfly Count revealed | Butterfly Conservation (butterfly-conservation.org)</u>.

Gardens that are wildlife friendly provide vital habitat for these insects, allowing them space to feed, breed and shelter. Gatekeepers and the similar- looking Meadow Browns may be seen in gardens as well as around open fields and meadows. Gatekeepers are mainly orange, with brown fringes around their wings. Their forewings have a black 'eye' with two small white dots in each. They are slightly smaller than Meadow Browns, with



a wingspan of around 40-47mm. They feed on wild marjoram, common fleabane, ragworts and bramble. Meadow Browns also have a black 'eye' on their forewings, but with just one white dot in each and are mostly brown, with dappled orange on their wings. They are slightly larger than Gatekeepers with a wingspan of 50-55mm, photo credit: Charles J. Sharp (CC BY-SA 4.0). They feed on wild marjoram, lavender, rudbeckia, buddleia and thistles.



There is something particularly thrilling about seeing orchids growing in the wild. Perhaps it is because they are a rare sight today with over 97% of the UK's orchid meadows disappearing since the mid-20th century and also bring back childhood memories of walks through meadows or grassland humming with grasshoppers, bumblebees and butterflies. How tragic that the experience is now limited to a few areas. However, due to the chalk geology and low- intensity grazing management in late spring and early summer, around the Letcombes there remain patches where orchid spikes may still be seen. Crucially orchids need to flower and set countless dust-like seeds rather than being eaten or trampled by grazing animals or cut down too early with the grasses for hay. Another key feature shared by the best meadows is the avoidance of fertilizers since nutrient enrichment favours high-yielding species, such as perennial rye grass and white clover, so once wildflower-rich fields become irrevocably changed into bland and species-poor monocultures. Orchids form mycorrhizal associations with specific fungi to successfully germinate and survive their early below-ground stage. Once the developing orchid begins photosynthesising, it may become less dependent on its fungal life-support system, although many do maintain this relationship throughout their life cycle. It is the chance association between wind-blown seeds and fungi that explains why so many seeds must be produced and also why the orchids at certain sites appear so prolifically.

A range of orchids flower from early spring through to summer. Early orchids include the Early purple orchid, *Orchis mascula*, with magenta spikes appearing above a rosette of heavily spotted leaves in April. The colour of this orchid attracts bees but by the time they discover the cluster of flowers (called inflorescences) have no nectar, the bees have already pollinated the flowers. Common spotted orchids, *Dactylorhiza fuchsii, also have* dark spotted leaves but the tapering inflorescences are in shades of pink, marked with purple lines. This orchid is found in grassland and open woodlands and may often be seen growing in disturbed habitats like road verges, sometimes in large numbers.

Those orchids that are still flowering this month include the Bee orchid named because within the large pink sepals is a structure that resembles the body of a bumblebee and emits a scent that mimics the female sex pheromones enticing male bees to try to mate with them, picking up and transferring the sticky male pollinia in the process. Apparently the strategy is rarely effective in the native Bee orchid, *Ophrys apifera* (photo right in local paddock), which instead self-pollinates efficiently when its pollinia dangle down and touch the







malformed blooms. Fragrant orchids, *Gymnadenia conopsia*, release a sweet, orangey smell that is strongest in the evenings attracting butterflies and moths that feed from a long nectar spur behind each flower. Once considered a single species, they have now been split into three distinct types – chalk, heath and marsh – with the geology and habitat dictating precisely which species is found where. Pyramidal orchids, *Anacamptis pyramidalis, are the ones seen in the highest numbers around the Letcombes. These orchids* have a dense cone of flowers, the purple colour darkening towards the apex of the pyramid shape; the cone lengthens to become more cylindrical with age. They are pollinated by moths, including day-flying Burnet moths. Keep your eyes open for these three orchids

which all may be seen locally. The Letcombes Conservation Group record, which goes back over 20 years, has recorded over one thousand pyramidal orchids flowering in the past on one old gallop on private land and again this year (photo left). The weather in 2022/3 appears to have suited their life cycle.
