

# **Letcombes Gardening Club**

### **Topical Tips**

Finally some lovely sunny weather! The plants are now starting to grow. June is the time for the traditional English garden to really 'strutt it's stuff'. Hopefully any hard work you did in the previous months will be paying dividends now and you will be able to stand back and admire your garden.

The weeds will also be enjoying this lovely weather so you will need to continue hoeing if you have any bare soil in your beds.

Remember to stake any floppy plants in good time to avoid them developing 'comical shapes' (the voice of experience speaking here).

You should be able to plant out your cannas and dahlias now. Any gaps you have in the borders can always be filled with annual summer bedding.

Don't be afraid to trim back any trailing plants that are looking tatty. They will readily produce new growth. The same goes for oriental poppies and euphorbia flowers. They can look pretty awful when they have finished so give them the chop!

If your hostas are coming into growth, now is the time to divide them and generate lots of lovely new plants.

I say this every year. Remove spent forget-me-nots so your garden doesn't become overrun with them next year!

If you have a deciduous magnolia, now is the time to tame it. If you do this in winter you'll get dieback and if you do it in late winter or spring you'll get bleeding.

Clematis montana can get very big and unruly with lots of dead stems. You can cut them out now and remember, you can be really ruthless with this clematis if it's getting very large. You won't kill it but you will be the boss!!

I'm going to venture, very briefly, onto the lawn now! Leave your grass a little longer in dry spells as it will cope better. Don't water it! It will cope. When you do cut your grass, only add the clippings to the compost heap in thin layers otherwise you'll end up with a poorly aerated, slimy heap!

Now a little section for the veg growers. You should be starting to harvest now. June is the end of the asparagus season so make the most of the last week or so and then give it some fertilizer and leave it to grow.

All those more tender veg like squash, courgettes and beans, that you have raised under glass can be planted out now.

You need to keep hoeing, as veg don't like to have to compete with weeds.

When you are sowing seeds in dry weather, water the seed drill first as this means the young plants will develop a good root system.

Well I think that will do. I suggest that you pour yourself a glass of wine, find a nice seat in your garden and enjoy!

#### Parish Council Annual Report 2022-2023

Pleasingly the recovery from Covid-19 continues and the lockdown is beginning to become a distant memory. Parish life is thriving and is a testament to everyone who contributes throughout the year, from bakers, to litter pickers, event organisers, conservation volunteers, the list goes on.

I continued as chairman for a further year and am grateful to the whole of the Parish Council, especially my Vice Chair, Loretta Light, and the Parish Clerk, Liz Jenkins, for their continuing support with all things 'Parish'.

2022-2023 has proved another busy year and you will have been able to keep up to date via the PC minutes, but here are a few highlights.

The Queens Platinum tea was a huge success enjoyed by over 170 parish residents. I must record the PC's sincere thanks to all those who contributed to a wonderful afternoon.

The Burial Ground improvements are almost complete with grass reinforcement enabling access through the new Lych Gate, where two new benches have been placed. The additional parking is also well used by those using the excellent sport and leisure facilities, which at the same time helps prevent obstructive parking on village roads.

The Register, an important means of communication to every household, continues to be compiled on a monthly basis by Francesca Engelmann and the PC thanks her sincerely for her forbearance and patience. At the last meeting the PC was asked if it were possible to return to the paper version, sadly costs of both production and distribution are prohibitive. However we can of course accommodate individual requests, so please contact the Clerk.

This year we have finalised the new arrangements for keeping the village tidy, and after significant efforts have engaged a new contractor who offers consistency, value for money and most importantly removes all debris. We are grateful to Arran Lax who until recently has worked to keep the village tidy.

Sadly another royal milestone was reached during this year with the death of Queen Elizabeth II. The PC was able to lead on implementing the official protocols, alongside the Church, and among other things a book was placed in the Church for those wishing to leave messages of condolence. My thanks go to Cllr Loretta Light for her specific role in this.

A particular concern this year has been the continuing issue of water run off and drainage. Our District Councillor Paul Barrow and Parish Councillors Paul Batchelor and David Barber have worked tirelessly to achieve some significant results especially on Warborough Road. Working with the new owner of Warborough Farm Tony Ruane, a wildlife pond has been reinstated halfway down the hill and other works completed to help prevent flooding lower down in the village. We were fortunate to apply for, and receive, a grant for this work from our County Councillor Yvonne Constance.

Regrettably with major changes to the country's political leadership, together with economic pressures, it was necessary to raise the precept for 23-24 by 6% just to maintain our current services going forward. However within the year the PC Budget planning has meant that we remain in a positive financial position. We do however continue to seek out any grant funding that may be available to us which can support the Parish.

As ever there have been many consultations, too many to list, but you can be assured that the Parish Council responds on your behalf, ensuring we maintain a voice in the wider issues that may affect us. My fellow councillors and myself continue to represent the Parish on a number of important local and national bodies, as reported in last years' Annual Report. These range from The Letcombe Brook Project to the Oxfordshire Association of Local Council Executive. We continue to maintain links with BBOWT and CPRE amongst others.

Cllr Batchelor has continued to address the communications infrastructure within the village including trying to ensure that Airband meet their contractual requirements and understanding what their future proposals are and addressing the issues of poor mobile signals in many parts of the village. Regrettably this is still ongoing.

A review of the PC website was undertaken earlier this year, and the responses indicated there were no major changes needed, but to continue to ensure that everything is up to date and current.

This snapshot again indicates a very busy year for the PC, and it is also a year of change. At this point I would like to thank Cllr Kristine Hitchcock, Cllr Doug Frewer and my Vice Chair Loretta Light for their unfailing support as they stand down from the Parish Council. Their efforts have helped ensure we continue to live and enjoy our wonderful environment and community. We must also extend our thanks to our District Councillor Paul Barrow and also our County Councillor Yvonne Constance for their continuing support throughout the year.

What will we be doing next year?

Well those standing down will be enjoying a well-earned break, whist the new councillors Tom Griffin and Gordon Lundie will be joining us to continue the work of the council.

We will be seeking to get the state of our roads improved.

We will be responding to proposals that effect our community

We will continue to seek out grant funding wherever possible

We will respond to individual issues as they arise.

On 14<sup>th</sup> May we had Ness's first service of Holy Communion at St Andrew's. There was a large congregation to greet her and coffee was served after the service by Mary Harrison, which provided an opportunity for more of us to get to know our new Rector. As well as welcoming Ness the congregation wanted to thank The Revd Mary Harwood for all she has done for us throughout the interregnum and she was presented with flowers and other gifts to show our appreciation.

The APCM was held in the church on Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> May. Debbie Webb told us that she would like to stand down as church warden, but she is willing to continue until a new warden can be found. Debbie has done so much for St Andrew's as church warden for over two years and in supporting the previous wardens and we are very grateful. David Allchin reported that the church finances are in a sound condition, particularly for a small parish like St Andrew's. Debbie gave the fabric report and again everything seems to be going well. Thanks to a local benefactor, who is prepared to cover the costs, it is hoped that the pews may be polished and the Victorian tiles restored. In the Rector's report Ness said how grateful she is for the welcome she has had in the benefice, and thanked all those who have kept everything running smoothly through the vacancy period. She also specially mentioned her interest in children and families and how important they are to the future of the church.

The services in June will be as usual. On Mondays Prayer Group at 10.30 am and Evensong at 3 pm and Holy Communion on the second Sunday at 10 am and a Lay-led service on the fourth Sunday also at 10 am. ### Friends of the Letcombe Valley Community Nature Reserve

Work parties continue in the Community Nature Reserve on Saturday, 17 June from 13:30 to 16:30. Please meet near the lake notice board by 13:20 for the tasks and safety briefing. The main tasks are likely to be scrub clearance, fence repairs, minor tree pruning over paths and general maintenance. Wellingtons will be required to work on the new pond. Tools will be provided, and refreshments mid-afternoon, but please take your own work gloves.

The May work party covered much activity including repairing a bridge and scything around the main paths and benches. Mark Bradfield, Letcombe Brook Project Officer, found a little toad on a path edge (photo right) and commented on the chalk bank, 'Lovely to see so much yellow rattle about to burst into colour on the chalk bank up above the pond. That bit should get better and better over the next few weeks with knapweed and scabious coming into flower in a few weeks' time. A great spot to look out for butterflies during June and July. The wildflowers are slowly increasing on the chalk bank after years and years of grazing and scything to reduce the dominant grasses and give the wildflowers a chance to spread. Look out for Clustered bellflower too, a real stunner and the pink Common restharrow later in the summer, right on the path edge'.

Yellow rattle, *Rhinanthus minor*, gives a distinctive 'rattle' sound when the flowers fade, from the tiny seeds that ripen inside the seed head. It is an annual that thrives in grasslands as a semi-parasite by feeding off the nutrients in the roots of nearby grasses, photo credit right: Mark Bradfield. For this reason, it is often used to

promote grassland into meadow by reducing the vigour of the grasses eventually allowing more delicate wildflower species to establish. Common restharrow, *Ononis repens*, is a low-growing, creeping plant with leaves that are greasy to the touch and divided into three oval leaflets. It has hairy stems and clusters of small, pink, pea-like flowers, photo credit left: Evelyn Simak (CC BY-SA 2.0).The extremely tough, thick roots spread in a dense network and its



common name refers to the days of horse-drawn cultivation when it could arrest

Other flowers to look out for by the pond are the tall reed stems of Yellow flag iris, *Iris pseudacorus* (photo right), with large, yellow petals that fold



to right), with large, yellow petals that fold back on themselves and hang down around the outer edges of the flower. It has long, narrow grey-green leaves and grows on the margin of water. Another flower that has established on the margin of the pond is Ragged-robin, *Lychnis flos-cuculi* (photo left) a declining plant as wild wetland areas disappear from the landscape. It is a moisture-loving perennial plant bearing divided (hence the name) pink, star-shaped flowers with nectar that attracts bees and butterflies as well as dragonflies which, in



turn, bring frogs, toads and other animals. The leaves are narrow and grass-like. It is thanks to the dedicated work of volunteers each month that the biodiversity of the

Community Nature Reserve is being restored and increasing.



### **The Letcombes Conservation Group**

Summer really has arrived and the newly opened leaves on all the shrubs and trees bring a freshness with their bright green colouration and shade as temperatures rise. The value of trees to wildlife depends partly on whether they are standing as an individual or are part of a group. An individual, or open-grown tree, usually in the shape of a hemisphere or cone, is able to realise its full potential for leaf area and flowering thus maximising pollen and fruit production. This was understood by swine herders; the name for the place where pigs went out to fatten on the acorn mast, *aecer/ akker/ acker* in Old English, came to mean a unit of mast for one pig and the area of an acre. The larger lower branches of open-grown trees increase in girth with the increase in trunk circumference and, being

horizontal, catch the light differently to vertical branches and hold water for longer so they provide niches for wildlife not found on plantation trees. Research demonstrates that scattered trees also are key for biodiversity, whilst dense stands of trees provide conditions of shade and humidity required by many wildlife species. A native hornbeam already 2.5 m tall was planted by the Letcombes Conservation Group in the Letcombe Valley Community Nature Reserve in warm sunshine on March 2<sup>nd</sup> (photo right) for the late Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee extended Queen's Green Canopy initiative. The leaves are now fully open and are the food plant for caterpillars of a number of



moth species. The tree will keep some of its leaves all year round, turning golden-yellow to orange in autumn when the winged fruits develop to be eaten by finches, tits and small mammals and next spring it will bear catkins. In a few years the tree should be a reasonable size and provide shelter, roosting, nesting and foraging opportunities for mammals and birds through winter.

Helping nature is one of the five themes of this year's *30 Days Wild*, the nature challenge run by The Wildlife Trusts during the month of June that invites people of all ages to connect with nature every single day. There's no set structure, so you can take part in a way that suits you, possibly based on some of the other themes of tune into the senses; movement and play; learning and discovery and emotional connection to nature. <u>Wildlife Trusts</u> for ideas on connecting with nature whether it is a walk or observing wildlife from your home like one of the last summer visitors to arrive - the Spotted Flycatcher, a Red Listed bird in serious decline, photo credit: Mike Pennington (CC BY-SA 2.0). They have greyish brown feathers and a pale belly, and an excellent hunting technique perching to wait for an unsuspecting moth, butterfly or another winged insect to fly by, dashing out to grab its prey on the wing when it is within striking distance before returning to their perch. The best places to see this bird are in parks, mature gardens, woodland with open glades and churchyards.



Another opportunity is to contribute to this year's Churches Count on Nature during which the data for St. Andrew's



churchyard will be updated from **June 3<sup>rd</sup> to 11<sup>th</sup>**, **2023**. **The charity** *Caring for God's Acre* has been encouraging all who help to look after churchyards and burial grounds to celebrate the wildlife found in these places in the month of June for many years. The survey is a joint initiative with the Church of England, the Church in Wales and A Rocha UK. St. Andrew's features on <u>Caring</u> For God's Acre – the conservation for burial grounds

<u>across the UK – Protecting Wildlife, Preserving Heritage, Involving People (caringforgodsacre.org.uk)</u> in the section *Find a Flowery Burial Ground* after the first survey event held here in 2021. If you are interesting in helping to survey the churchyard wildlife this June, please contact Christine on <u>cbirch1997@aol.com</u> or 763529. It is thanks to the committed work of Anne Williams that the wildflower area of the churchyard supports such a wide range of wildlife.
