Message from the Parish Council

The Parish Council remains very grateful to Francesca for her continuing work in editing the Register. We hope that her recent health improvements will continue and result in a full recovery.

At our recent meeting, following a full discussion regarding the state of our roads, it was agreed we will continue to follow up formally with County Councillor Gant who visited the village earlier in the year. The particularly bad areas are the bottom of South Street, and the deep pothole opposite Manor fields, currently marked out with a traffic cone. It will add further pressure if you also report the issues on <u>Fix my street</u> Please be careful when driving in these areas.

We are still seeking a replacement for our Parish Clerk, who has decided to retire later in the year. If you are interested, or know of someone who may, be please contact either Liz or myself. In addition we still have two vacancies on the Parish Council. The role is interesting and varied, we meet in person for around two hours every second month, with email communication between times. Please do consider this opportunity to put something back into you community. Either Liz or I will be happy to provide more details.

The PC website is about to be refreshed and any ideas you may have for improvements will be welcomed . Again please contact Liz our Parish Clerk with any suggestions.

We are fortunate to have significant environmental expertise in the village and in the future hope to work to support the Conservation Group in a wildlife audit. More details will be communicated as they emerge.

Some of you will have noticed that as a result of the recent bad weather damage has occurred to the Parish Council Burial Ground Noticeboard. A temporary repair has been done thanks to Councillor Barber and we are seeking quotes for either a refurbishment or replacement. The remaining hedging plants around the perimeter have now be planted and the lavender and roses will be planted by the new entrance once the weather conditions allow.

A date for your diary, the Annual Parish Meeting will take place in the village hall on Monday 20 May, 7pm. All are welcome to attend.

Some sad news, Doug Frewer a Letcombe Regis Parish Councillor for many years, and a true supporter of the village has passed away aged 93. His contribution to the Parish was considerable and he will be sorely missed by many.

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The Letcombes Conservation Group

C ome and hear how the quality of this globally rare chalk stream habitat has been improved to support its wildlife from Mark Bradfield, Letcombe Brook Project Officer since 2018, before he leaves the area. This event in Letcombe Regis Village Hall at 7:00pm on Wednesday, 17 April is a re-run of Mark's sold-out talk '*Improving Biodiversity on the Letcombe Brook'* given at the Vale and Downland Museum in January. Later in the month, Thursday 25 April is designated World Penguin Day chosen to correspond with the northward migration of native Adélie penguins from Antarctica for better access to the sea in the southern winter months after nesting on the coastal beaches. The day celebrates all penguins and highlights the plight of these birds adapted to spending three-quarters of their lives at sea dependent on the oceans for their food. There are around 18 species of these flightless birds, found only in the Southern Hemisphere, 10 of them considered to be endangered and three near-threatened. The smallest penguin is the Little or Blue Penguin found in Australia, Tasmania and New Zealand which reach a maximum height around 30 centimetres whilst Antarctic Emperor Penguins may grow to four times that height. Current threats to penguins include a loss of sea ice in Antarctica due to climate change, which impacts upon chick hatching and the availability of krill. Overfishing and pollution from plastic and oil spills also have contributed to decreasing populations, as has loss of habitat.

In March, The British Antarctic Survey published disturbing news from their two research bases of King Edward Point and Bird Island on the sub-Antarctic Islands of South Georgia. Several individual penguins had tested positive for High Pathogenicity Avian Influenza (HPAI), including five King Penguin and five Gentoo Penguins. This is the first time the virus has been detected in Gentoo and King Penguin populations on the islands, although HPAI was first detected in Brown Skuas at Bird Island in October 2023 followed in early 2024 by confirmed cases in populations of Antarctic terns and Wandering Albatross as well as Elephant and Fur seals, see <u>Penguins test positive for Avian Flu on South Georgia - British Antarctic Survey (bas.ac.uk)</u> for details. World Penguin Day encourages an appreciation of these amazing birds and a resolve to tackle pollution and climate change at the personal and national level.



Friends of the Letcombe Valley Community Nature Reserve

The next work party in the Community Nature Reserve will be on the third Saturday in the month, 20 April, from 13:30 to



16:30. Please meet near the lake notice board by 13:20 for the tasks and safety briefing. The main tasks are likely to be continuing the clearance alongside the public footpath, repairing handrails, making good bridge repairs and fencing as well as creating habitat piles with the arisings from the recent ash felling work. Tools will be provided, and mid-afternoon refreshments too, but please take your own work gloves.

Ash die back signs are posted on the Community Nature Reserve gates, but be assured that the work is essential and for every tree felled, three replacements will be planted in the reserve. Around the Horse chestnut trees and stumps near the lake, the remnants of the bluebell waves are emerging. Bluebells are one of our later spring flowers, blooming towards the end of April and into May or even later further north. These plants prefer undisturbed soil and therefore are associated with ancient woodlands, but suffered here when the horse chestnut trees had to be reduced due to disease. It can take over five years for a patch of bluebells to establish and they are only just recovering in patches where the bulbs were undamaged by the heavy machinery.

Keep a lookout for other signs of spring amongst the wooded area, like the arrival of Pied Flycatchers in the next few weeks, The first sighting of a Swallow skimming over the water for insects is a sure sign that warmer weather is on its way as the

swallows make their long migratory return flying up to 6000 miles from over -wintering in South Africa, photo credit: Mark Bradfield. In the coming weeks, they will begin gathering mud and straw to construct their cup-shaped nests. Other birds that have been heard in the Community Reserve in March, but are rarely glimpsed, are the Water rail and Woodcock. Another elusive bird, the Cetti's warbler, first recorded in the UK in the early 1960s, is now both breeding and over-wintering in England and Wales with the warming climate. It is chestnut brown on top with a grey-brown underside but has a distinct, explosive song that sets it apart from other warblers. Two closely related warbler species arrive in the UK during April. Sedge warblers have a dark eye stripe, while Reed Warblers are a classic 'little brown bird', warm brown on top with a buff brown underside. Their songs can be hard to separate but the behaviour of these two warblers is distinctive. Sedge Warblers are often perched in scrubby vegetation singing at the top of their voices to attract a mate. They perform a display while they sing, rocketing up from their perch and warbling with gusto. In contrast, Reed warblers usually loiter in the dense reeds, their loud song erupting from the vegetation. Both may be heard early in the dawn chorus.



More butterflies will start appearing this month too. Brimstones and Commas appeared throughout March on sunny days, both likely to have overwintered as adults. Watch out now for the Orange-tip butterfly, named for the distinctive feature of the males of this species, although the females are not as easily identifiable with their black wing tips. The Orange-tip butterfly is one of the first species to emerge which has spent winter in its chrysalis. Due to changing land use and a consequent decline in hay meadows and Cuckoo Flowers, the caterpillars of this butterfly are now heavily dependent on the eggs laid on Garlic mustard as their food source. Garlic mustard is plentiful in the Community Nature Reserve and around the village lanes. Spring and wildlife is blooming in this special place.


The film is based on the book "*If it's not impossible…..'* by Barbara Winton, Nicky Wintons daughter. The story begins when as a 79yr old Nicky is clearing old files and finds documents that bring back painful and poignant memories of an amazing period in his life. On a visit to Prague in 1938 he saw refugee camps full of families who had fled the rise of the Nazis in Germany and Austria, and now feared they would invade Czechoslovakia. He worked tirelessly to convince the British Committee for Refugees to help him rescue hundreds of mostly Jewish children before the Nazis closed the borders.

A cast of the highest calibre is led by Sir Anthony Hopkins who plays Nicky Winton in a role that is perfect for him. Johnny Flynn plays the young Winton seen in flashbacks, with Helen Bonham-Carter playing his mother Babette who herself had been a Jewish German immigrant. The all star cast also includes Jonathan Price, Lena Olin and Romola Gari.

Letcombes Gardening Club

Topical Tips

pril is a really busy month in the garden, so get your tools to the ready for all the jobs!

Two words; seed sowing! I'll get to the veg later but you can sow hardy annuals in modules now for planting out later. It may be best to leave sowing direct until late this month or into next month when you can fill in gaps with beautiful drifts. This is when hardy annuals really come into their own as long as you don't hoe them up as seedlings when they germinate!

As far as bulbs are concerned you can plant out summer bulbs now. Yes, bulbs aren't just for spring! Take a look at the catalogues or in the garden centres.

As far as pruning goes, if you didn't prune your lavender after flowering last year then you can prune it now. Make sure you cut above a new shoot or it won't re-grow.

You can still lift and divide perennials, something for gardening club members to take note of as it will provide more plants for the Plant Market. You can also divide clumps of bulbs and bamboo in the same way. Just make sure each clump has shoots and roots and keep the new plants watered.

It's a good idea to dead-head daffodils and tulips if you can as this means the plant puts all it's energy into bulb regeneration rather than seed production.

What about a new project? You could plant up an alpine trough as many alpines look really good at this time of year and if the trough is raised up it will be easier to admire them. Make sure you use a well draining planting medium though otherwise they may rot off.

Lets turn our attention briefly to trees and shrubs. You can cut out any frost damaged shoots from evergreens this month and while you're about it, if you have any variegated evergreens that have reverted then cut these shoots out too as they will be stronger growing and eventually take over.

I'm going a little more specialized now and I'm going to talk about ponds. Your aquatic plants like feeding too! If you have any large water lilies then they are big feeders so press a slow release tablet well below soil level at the base of the plant. Probably a job for a warm day!

If you have any vigorous pond plants then you can contain them by planting them in baskets, or so the advice goes. I'm sceptical as I have a couple of real thugs in our pond, which easily "leap out of" baskets and we're going to have to be brutal again this year!

I've left veg until last as usual but to be honest this is where a lot of the work exists this month. Here's a word gleaned from the wise. Warm days do tend to cause a rush of enthusiasm but we can still get frosty nights, which may cause you to lose your seedlings. These can always be regrown but you won't get your wasted time back so don't be too hasty, the allotment/veg patch will always catch up!

You can continue to plant out seed potatoes, a job that should be finished by the end of the month. You should also finish planting your onion sets.

I'm not going to list out all the seeds you should be sowing now as I may overrun my allotted space and make life difficult for the editor and I'm sure you can read the instructions on the packets. Do make sure you check the sowing times though and don't miss the boat.

Why not plant up an asparagus bed if you have space? You will need to be patient though as you will have to give time for the plants to establish.

One more quick sentence before signing off, check your soft fruit bushes for aphids and put up the netting on your strawberries because the birds will already be eyeing them up!

Time to go now so get out there and enjoy!
