



ere's an idea to contribute to citizen science whilst walking off all those festive foods. The Botanical Society of

Britain and Ireland are calling for assistance in their research on climate change. Take a short walk during each of the four days around New Year, 30 December to 2 January, and note any wildflowers in bloom. Without a drop in average temperatures, many widespread and common plants are still flowering in midwinter. Register and check the plant identifier advice at New Year Plant Hunt – Botanical Society of Britain & Ireland (bsbi.org) and then submit your observations online.

Perhaps one New Year resolution might be to record wildlife you observe

during the coming year, be it flowers, frogs, toads, newts, hedgehogs, lizards,



the system are made available to National Recording Schemes, Local Environmental Record Centres and the National Biodiversity Network Atlas, NBN Atlas, the UK's largest collection of biodiversity data. To record your observations you'll need to know what species you have seen plus where and when you saw it but don't worry if you're not an expert, iSpot is a website aimed at helping anyone identify UK wildlife. To add an observation to iSpot and request help with identification, all you need to do is register on the website UK and Ireland | iSpot (ispotnature.org) and then upload the information, ideally accompanied by a digital photograph so that others can comment on what you've seen and make suggestions as to what it is. As you become more experienced, you can suggest an identification on your own sighting, as well as help others by adding an identification to an existing observation. There are also many local and national groups for specific wildlife often with their own logging systems, such as for hedgehogs at: https://bighedgehogmap.org, whose members will assist with identification. The scheme for our local area is the Thames Valley Environmental Record Centre, see Share your records | Thames Valley Environmental Records Centre (tverc.org) for details.

The RSPB run the Big Garden Birdwatch survey which will take place this month between 26 and 28 January, 2024. You can join the survey by recording the birds you observe landing in your garden, from your balcony or in a green space within the village for one hour between these dates, see Big Garden Birdwatch (rspb.org.uk).

Remember to submit your observations by 13 February.

Enjoy the wildlife in and surrounding our village throughout 2024 and contribute to its conservation simply by adding your observations to the national records.





Friends of the Letcombe Valley Nature Reserve

The first work party of the New Year in the Community Nature Reserve will be on the third Saturday in the month, 20 January, from 13:30 to 16:30. Please meet near the lake notice board by 13:20 for the tasks and safety briefing. Tools will be provided, and refreshments too mid-afternoon, but please take your own work gloves.

The local Wildlife Trust, BBOWT, is responsible for the management of the Letcombe Valley Community Nature Reserve, though the work is mainly carried out by volunteers under the direction of local 'Friends of the Reserve'

and volunteers with the Letcombe Brook Project also work along the Letcombe Brook through the Reserve and the village. The Letcombe Brook Project has worked for 20 years on improving the quality of the chalk stream and supporting its wildlife, since 2018 with Mark Bradfield as Project Officer. Mark will be giving a talk at the Vale and Downland Museum on Improving Biodiversity on the Letcombe Brook on Wednesday, 10 January at 1:30pm. Tickets must be booked in advance either at the Museum or online at https://bit.ly/41i9F9u (not suitable for children under 16 years). The Project is currently seeking a new experienced officer to deliver ecological and landscape enhancements plus community engagement work on the chalk stream. For further details see

The practical work carried out by volunteers in the Community Reserve and along the Letcombe Brook corridor is much appreciated and vital at the local level. The Wildlife Trusts work together at the national level to campaign on environmental issues affecting habitats and wildlife and rely on concerned individuals lending support. One such campaign involves the use of the neonicotinoid Thiamethoxam, a chemical banned in the EU since 2018, on sugar beet seed. For the past three years the UK government has allowed an exemption for British Sugar. Another



application for its use in 2024 has been submitted, despite the Expert Committee on Pesticides repeatedly advising the government against authorising the banned pesticide, warning that the risks to honeybees and other pollinators outweigh any likely benefits for sugar beet growers. These chemicals persist in the soil and enter hedgerow plants, watercourses and ponds. In 2023 a third of sugar beet farmers decided against using the chemical, preferring to farm in a sustainable way that protects the future of pollinators and other invertebrates. Lend your support to the campaign to protect bees, other pollinators and

wildlife by adding your voice now at: Say yes to healthy bees, rivers and fields | The Wildlife Trusts

Another campaign has related to the crucial role peatlands play in carbon storage to mitigate against climate change rather than producing carbon dioxide through exposing peat to the air. Protecting peatlands is an issue in which individuals' actions can be a force for change. The government has decided not to fully ban the use of peat in horticulture across England, though Wales has pledged to follow any ban in England and Scotland is at the consultation stage. A government announcement made on 27 August, 2022 stated that 'The sale of peat for use in the amateur gardening sector will be banned by 2024 to protect peatlands and the natural environment' but no enforcement laws have been written yet. However, according to Defra, sales of bagged peat composts still will be banned in 2024; advice on 'peat-free' growing is available at Peat-free gardening / RHS Gardening. Some peat-containing products such as potted house plants and bedding plants will be on sale until 2026, whilst plug and specialist plants as well as mushrooms grown in peat will be exempt from any ban until 2030. Nevertheless, purchasing peat-free compost from 2024 onwards is a positive choice for a measure to lessen climate change and consumer power is a marvellous force for change which gives hope for peatlands and their wildlife.



Topical Tips

 \mathbf{I} hope you have all had a great Christmas and are well rested and keen to start the new gardening year!

There can be some really crisp, bright days in January and it's worth going out into the garden to search out the odd, elusive flower that may be blooming or to admire the frost on any seed heads that you have left in place.

This month is the time to prune freestanding apple and pear trees. That should keep you warm.

If you have taken the plunge and ordered some more unusual seeds, then this is the last month you can sow any that need frost to germinate. We're often talking about native trees, shrubs and alpines here.

Still on the subject of seed sowing, if you like to start your sweet peas early then now is the time to do it.

I say this every year, but if you have hellebores then they will be flowering soon and are likely to hide their beautiful flowers beneath last year's grotty old leaves so trim all the foliage off at ground level and enjoy them in all their glory!

If you're feeling cold then you can start to rake up any debris off the garden beds and remove any weeds. You should also check any outdoor pots that you have planted up and remove debris from these too.

You can plant bare root roses and deciduous trees this month. You can also move any deciduous trees and shrubs if the ground is not frozen so I hope you noted down which ones are in the wrong place when they were still in leaf! Maybe they don't need moving though and just need to be 'tamed' a little. If this is the case then now is the time to do it as you can see what you're doing when there are no leaves in the way!

Lets talk ponds for a bit! If your pond level is dropping quite drastically then the cold weather may have caused the liner or concrete to crack, causing a leak. Make sure you keep it topped up until the spring when you can carry out some repairs. Don't worry; I'm not suggesting wading into it in the middle of winter!

What about lawns? Well, unaccustomed as I am to talking about them or even giving them any attention or TLC in any way, I have to say that you should avoid walking across them in frosty weather, as you'll crush them! You could even consider laying some stepping-stones across your lawn if you really like to regularly take a short cut across it. I've also spotted a little tip about molehills whilst idly browsing. Moles become more active in January and February because they're mating and nest building. The molehills are unsightly I know but apparently you should try and live with them if possible but if that seriously offends your sensibilities then remove the largest ones and firm the soil down ready for reseeding in spring.

The same goes for worm casts. You can brush them away if you wish but they're actually a sign of a healthy lawn.

I have very little to say about fruit and veg this month. You can clear up debris on the veg beds but don't bother with soil preparation yet. There's also plenty of time for seed sowing later and the days are too short and cold to do this and have any success anyway. One thing you can do is dig up a few roots of rhubarb, divide them and leave them on the surface for a few days to get frosted prior to forcing.

In the meantime the topical tips lady and her husband would like to wish you all a Happy and Healthy New Year with lots of good gardening!
